

Understanding Globalization



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David McLaughlin Speaks to Adventures in Learning Membership

Those attending the Adventures in Learning Annual Meeting in May were fortunate to have the opportunity to hear distinguished President *Emeritus* of Dartmouth College, and current Colby-Sawyer College Trustee David McLaughlin, speak about his views on *The Value of Disagreeing Civilly*.

With an illustrious educational and career background, David is well qualified to speak on the subject. He captured the attention of the Adventures in Learning audience throughout his talk with many moments of humor. He suggested

that there was probably no one in the audience who has not been engaged in some form

of disagreement on a daily basis—at work, at home, or within the community. David went a step further by reminding us of the shortcomings that arise when significant

events having a profound influence on our lives aren't resolved in a constructive manner—e.g., the school funding issue in the New Hampshire legislature, the political deadlock in Congress, the problems in the Middle East and terrorism. He referred to the issues he faced as president of Dartmouth during a very contentious period at the college—relocation of the medical center, divestiture of investments in the college endowment in South Africa, reestablishment of ROTC, fraternities and resi-

stituencies to begin a dialogue that respects their differences and attempts to find reasonable grounds for agreement. Upon reflection, and through his vast experience, David was able to step back and give some thought to the cause of disagreement. He is impressed that Americans tend to disagree about most things—taxes, health care, education, environment, labor, regulations, municipal policy, etc. He feels it is useful in all these issues to find areas of agreement or to identify the cause of the disagreement with the purpose of achieving a "good society." He quoted philosophers and teachers who offer a variety of definitions for a good society and noted that out of their teachings we can begin to understand the basis for a reasonable dialogue on civil disagreement.

David has led a number of corporations, including Orion Safety Products, the Toro Company, and Champion International. He was president of Dartmouth College for six years, and served for 10 years as chairman, president, and CEO of the Aspen Institute, a global forum that convenes leaders from diverse disciplines to address critical issues. He currently is on the Board of Directors of Viacom, Atlas Air, PartnerRe, and Infinity Broadcasting.
