Born in Bennington, Vt., the son of an Episcopal clergyman, Peter

graduated from Holderness School and was attending Middlebury College when Pearl Harbor brought the United States into World War II. A volunteer for the Army Air Corps, he spent nearly a year in training as a pilot, then flew bombing missions in B-24s out of Italy for five months.

On his return to Middlebury, Peter changed his major to physics and graduated in the spring of 1947. He then married Jean Crawford and secured a teaching position as an instructor of physics at Phillips Academy in Andover, Mass. Although he had not planned to spend all his working years at Phillips Academy, he enjoyed teaching and found satisfaction working with young people.

In 1954, he received a Master of Education degree in Science Education from Harvard. In 1962, he

Designed for people with a serious interest in European history, this course, led by Joseph Kun, will deal with the exciting history of two interconnected regions — Hungary and Transylvania — and the problems that arise when different nationalities and religions must coexist in a small place. Gallagher and Shean in Egypt: American Vaudeville Looks at the Middle East

In this course participants will listen to (and sing) some of the songs that have perpetuated stereotypes about the Middle East that still dominate in the media and that have contributed to how most Americans view contemporary events in that part of the world. For those with memories of vaudeville days and those who enjoy vaudeville humor, Charles Kennedy returns to nudge your nostalgia, prompt a chuckle or two, and perhaps make you ponder the power of stereotypes.

Science and Religion: Allies or Opponents?

Are science and religion supportive or contradictory subjects? In this course, Ed Kintner will examine briefly—and as non-technically as practicable—the relationships among philosophy, religion, and science, beginning with the Greek philosophers, continuing through alchemy and astrology in the Middle ages, and ending with modern physical and cosmological theory.


Adventures in Cooking

Focus will be on the dogmas and deeds as well as the polemics and politics that created the foundation for today's inter-religious problems.
