## A History of Communications

Led by Mac Plante. This course traces the advances in technology and concept leading to development of the Internet and our contemporary communication techniques. Mac served in his career with Bell Laboratories, Wang Laboratories, and as advisor to the National Institute of Standards and Technology.

# The Habsburgs:

The Rise and Decline of a Dynasty Led by Joseph Kun, author and former director

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of Central European Studies at the Potomac Foundation. This course examines the 700-year impact of the royal Habsburg family upon the history and current affairs of Eastern and Central Europe.

### The Claremont Conundrum

Led by John Garvey, J.D. This course examines the hotly debated tax and education-funding issue in New Hampshire. A practicing attorney and former professor at Franklin Pierce Law Center, John served as a principal attorney in the Claremont Case, which resulted in a successful constitutional challenge to current methods of funding public education.

## Toward Understanding China

Led by Lorna Chang. This course explores a country and society of growing importance to the United States and the world. The course is informed by Lorna's travels in China and particularly the experiences of her husband, a Shanghai native, who


# **Sneak Preview of Fall Adventures**
